Nativity Lent

Nativity Lent lasts 40 days in the Orthodox Church. This is a time for prayer, fasting, confession, and preparing for the Savior's coming.

St. John Chrysostom – November 13

St. John, author of the Liturgy used in most Sunday services, was known as "Chrysostom" or "Golden-Mouthed" for his eloquence. Trained as a lawyer, he, instead, entered a monastery. He was ordained a priest in 386 AD. He was so popular and gifted as a preacher that he was elected to the Patriarchate of Constantinople at the age of 49. His crusade against the wealth and excessiveness of the royal court caused him to be banished. Even in exile, he continued to preach and write beautiful sermons for his beloved Church.

"When we teach our children to be gentle, to be forgiving, to instill virtue in their souls, we reveal the image of God within them. This then is our task: to educate both ourselves and our children in godliness; otherwise, what answer will we have before Christ's judgment seat?"
