St. Marina – July 17

Marina was born in Antioch during the reign of Emperor Claudius II (AD 270). When Marina was eighteen years old, she was walking to church when she was spotted by the prefect of the province, Olymbrios. Unfortunately for Marina, his was a case of love at first sight. When at last he asked for her hand, she declined as politely as possible, explaining that she had pledged her life to Jesus Christ and was waiting for the moment when she could enter His service in some manner.

Olymbrios' love then transformed into hate. Marina was led away to be tried on charges of treason, and was found guilty. She was stripped naked, whipped and burned with candles, allowed to heal and then tortured again in the same fashion over an agonizing period until she was finally beheaded. Death came to this devout girl on July 17, 289 AD.

People give all sorts of reasons for their lack of charity, their hardheartedness. Some say, "hard times."

But if the times are hard for those who have a sufficiency, how much harder are they for the poor? This pretext alone should lead one to give all the more generously.
