St. Moses the Ethiopian August 28

Moses, a native of Abyssinia, Ethiopia, was a great big brute who was a slave in the 4th century A.D. He had quite a reputation for his anger and violent behavior.

One day Moses and his gang raided a monastery. When he burst in on the Abbot, he expected the Abbot to be cowering in fear before him. Instead, the Abbot calmly faced Moses and looked into his eyes with great compassion. Moses was completely stunned by this. For the first time in his life, he felt repentance and regret for all the violence and hatred that he had allowed to consume him all of his life.

Moses broke up the gang and decided to stay at the monastery and learn from the Abbot. He confessed all his sins, began to pray and eventually chose to become a monk.

Moses, once a slave to others and to his own violent emotions, was able to free himself with God's love and to transform his passions into energies of the Holy Spirit. He received the crown of life on August 28.

Beheading of St. John the Baptist – August 29

St. John was the cousin of the Messiah, whom he anointed in baptism with the holy waters of the Jordan River. Although he is most often remembered for the baptism and for preaching the coming of Christ, he went on with his missionary work for many years. And for this, as for many others who preached Christ's word, he paid with his life. The senseless execution of this mighty servant of God is placed on the church calendar on August 29 to stir the awareness of Christians everywhere that mortality will never die because of saints such as John the Baptist.
